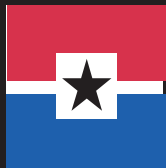

Service-Learning combines academic instruction with active community service, utilizing critical, reflective thinking to examine the world around you and your civic responsibilities. It is not volunteering. It is a mutually beneficial partnership, allowing you to apply what you learned in the classroom to the real world while developing new skills, improving your critical thinking skills, exploring career possibilities, and making a difference by meeting community needs and increasing citizen support.

The DCCCD Service-Learning Program offers you an opportunity to serve at a wide variety of charitable and social agencies. So come with an open mind and heart, and join the DCCCD commitment to serving the community, and to learning through service.

“I want to serve my community! How do I enroll? What are the requirements?”

- I. SELECT THE AGENCY WITH WHICH YOU WOULD LIKE TO SERVE
Consult with your instructor about choosing a site that not only matches your interests, but that will help you meet your learning goal. Please note that some agencies have a higher requirement of hours to participate. You must meet the agency's requirements to receive college credit.
- II. FILL OUT ENROLLMENT FORM AND RELEASE OF LIABILITY OBTAINED FROM YOUR INSTRUCTOR OR CAMPUS COORDINATOR
You won't be able to go forward until the enrollment form is completed.
- III. TAKE THE ENROLLMENT FORM AND RELEASE TO THE CAMPUS SERVICE-LEARNING COORDINATOR
Campus coordinators' locations and phone numbers are listed on the next page of this publication.
- IV. CONTACT YOUR SELECTED AGENCY & GET STARTED!
 - Do not wait until late in the semester to begin your service.
 - Some sites require 3-4 weeks just to process your application!
 - Orientation time does not count toward required hours.
- V. DOCUMENT YOUR TIME & FOLLOW THROUGH ON YOUR COMMITMENT
 - Give a minimum of 15 hours in service during the semester at a placement site listed in this newspaper. If your instructor or placement site has a higher minimum you must complete their requirement for credit.
 - Pick up a DCCCD Service-Learning timesheet from your instructor or Service-Learning coordinator. You and your site supervisor need to sign off on your hours.
 - Follow through with the volunteer schedule to which you commit. If for any reason you are unable to complete your commitment, you must notify your site supervisor, instructor, and campus Service-Learning coordinator as soon as possible. And...
 - You must return any credentials or volunteer jacket issued to you!
